

# **PRINCIPAL'S REPORT**

Jega Jegathesan, our Manager of Corporate Services passed away after a long illness and we farewelled him at a Memorial Service in our theatre on 13 July. Jega was an integral part of our Willetton family for over 40 years and made a profound impact on the school. His legacy will be lasting.

As I mentioned in the last newsletter, we have been investigating the possible use of Turnitin software to combat the plagiarism issues in student assessment from the use of Artificial Intelligence (AI). After close consideration, our Senior Management Team has decided that at this point, we will not be moving forward with purchase of the software. We will instead be examining how we structure our assessment questions and the method of delivery of assessments to limit or remove the opportunity for the use of AI. We will continue to review the use of software packages as the AI world further unfolds.

Our 2024 timetable is progressing smoothly. It is a complicated project involving management of student subject selection, rooming, staffing and curriculum requirements. It is well underway. Thanks to Jordan Newton and his team.

I have met with the Mayor of the City of Canning and as part of our discussions, we examined the safety issues for the current crossing for our students on Pine Tree Gully Road. We will be meeting again to finalise possible enhancements to the crossing with the support of the City of Canning. I will have more information for you once it comes to hand.

Our new classroom block is forging ahead towards completion, and we hope to have access in the very near future. The good news is that our bank of transportable classrooms adjacent to Pinetree Gully Road will be removed, and we will gain that strip of land for student use. We are currently planning how best to make use of that area. This is the end of an era - those who have been with us on our journey will be hard pressed to remember a Willetton without the Pinetree Gully Road transportables. We will still have one located elsewhere though – we have been granted a Home Economics transportable to bring our food facilities to four rooms.

The annual Young Originals 2023 Exhibition has opened at Edith Cowan University. Work from five of our talented visual arts students has been selected. The exhibition runs from 10-29 August, and we encourage you to attend.

# 2024 TUCKWELL SCHOLARSHIP - MEHVISH MEHBOOB

Our Head Girl, Year 12 student Mehvish Mehboob, has accepted an offer for a 2024 Tuckwell Scholarship at The Australian National University (ANU).

The Tuckwell Scholarship Program at ANU is the most transformational undergraduate scholarship program in Australia. With a total scholarship package valued at up to \$140,000, funding to students for five years of full-time study; allowing them to



take full advantage of their time at university, including the many academic, social, cultural, sporting and leadership opportunities that come with life on campus.

There were over 1200 applications for Tuckwell Scholarships. Mehvish was one of only 49 invited to interview in Canberra in early July, with only 25 successful recipients Australia wide.

This is a tremendous achievement for Mehvish, and we are proud of her thoroughly deserved success.










## PREMIER'S READING CHALLENGE




# SNIPPETS FROM YEAR 10 SCIENCE PROJECTS

Year 10 Science students have worked on projects for the past five weeks in Terms 2 and 3. Some are research investigations, others engineering, and we have also had an app produced this year. Here is a brief description of what our budding scientists achieved.



Double sided rake with hydraulic power.



Electrolytes (sodium hydroxide, sodium hydrogen carbonate, sodium nitrate, sodium chloride) in electrolysis using the Hoffman Voltameter – which produced most hydrogen. The finding was sodium hydroxide.




Cream Spraying Shaver sprays cream while shaving.




Anti-microbial properties of natural products – honey, garlic, vinegar, tree tea oil. Vinegar had the best properties.



Comparison of the specific heat capacities of iron and its alloys – alloys have more specific heat capacity.

The Egg-cellent Cookie Experiment - the diameter of cookies increased as the number of eggs in the recipe increased.



Which material is best for heat packs – rice, flaxseed, green lentils or silica beads? Rice won the top position.






## INTERSCHOOL DEBATING














# SOCRATIC QUESTIONS TO THE SECRET RIVER

## CANBERRA VIRTUAL TOUR

Mrs Kloosterman's Year 10 HaSS class was taken on a virtual trip to Canberra to explore the Australian War Memorial. We were guided by Claire, from the Australian War Memorial, who told us stories and taught us about Australian women who served on the Homefront during World War 2. She also showed us replicas of significant items from this time, such as the uniforms nurses wore.

The people Claire taught us about were: Ellen Savage, Mary Cubillo, Florence McKenzie, Peggy Williams, as well as the founder of the War Memorial itself, Charles Bean.

One of the most interesting and inspiring stories was that of the World War 2 Australian Hospital ship, the Centaur. It was attacked and sunk by the Japanese off the coast of Queensland in May 1943, killing 266 people in total. Of the 12 nurses on board, the only nurse who managed to survive was Ellen Savage. She was one of 64 survivors in total, who were at sea for a day and a half before they were rescued. During this time, Savage treated the injured and kept spirits high during this difficult time. For her

"conspicuous gallantry' Sister Savage was awarded a George Medal.

Another story we found very inspiring was that of Mary Cubillo. Mary was an Indigenous Australian, and the third oldest of nine children in her family. She was only 10 years old when her family was forced to evacuate from Darwin and move to Katherine because of threat of it being bombed by the Japanese. This was a massive lifestyle change for her and her family. Whilst living in Katherine, Mary and her family found out that Mary's father, John, was killed during the first air raid when he was working on the wharf, which impacted her life even further. Despite this, Mary remained strong and resilient, even with all the difficulties brought about by the war.

Overall, this virtual field trip to the Australian War Memorial has really helped us develop our understanding and knowledge of war on the Homefront. This experience really helped us see how regular Australians just like us had to step up and adapt to all the changes brought about by the war.

#### AN7AAS


Over the holidays, we attended the youth ANZAAS (Australia and New Zealand Association for the Advancement of Science) a science camp run by the Defence Forces which took place in Melbourne. There were approximately 50 students from around Australia and New Zealand accepted for this amazing opportunity.

We got to meet like-minded students from all over Australia and New Zealand and stay at Ormond College – getting the uni-student experience as we stayed in dorm rooms in a building that felt like Hogwarts. Over the week, we travelled around the city of Melbourne, attending lectures and seeing the research facilities of RMIT, Monash University and The University of Melbourne; and visiting the Melbourne Museum, the WEHI Medical Research centre, Science Works, a Defence force base and the Synchrotron (a particle accelerator which caused electrons to travel at almost the speed of light).

We learnt about metal 3D printing, physics, Earth Sciences and the science behind colour and optical illusions. We learnt about the new exhibit of the almost complete Triceratops fossil at the Museum, visited laboratories in action, got to interact with PhD students and researchers, learnt about the current research of the Defence force and all of the different applications of the Synchrotron.




# YEAR 9 STUDENTS EXCEL - FASHION TASTER COURSE
