BEN HENSHELL

Former basketball program student, Ben Henshell has secured a twoyear contract to play for the Perth Wildcats from 2023.

Graduating in 2021, Ben was accepted into the Australian Institute of Sport for 2022.

Having represented WA and Australia on multiple occasions, Henshall was named WABL Male Player of the Year in 2021.

The 18-year-old guard was a standout in the 2023 U20 National Championships, helping WA to the Gold Medal victory, and was also awarded the Bob Staunton Medal for the most outstanding male player of the tournament.

Ben wore the Australian team's green and gold singlet in February 2023, as part of the Australian Boomers team in the final two qualifying matches for the FIBA Basketball World Cup.

Having watched the Wildcats growing up, Ben has said he's excited to get the opportunity to suit up with the Wildcats team.

"It feels awesome, I've been watching the Wildcats play for a long time, so it feels amazing to finally get to suit up and play with all the boys," he said.





MADISON DE ROZARIO

Former student Madison has won the London Marathon for the second time after her win in 2018.

Her win was made even more of an achievement with a margin of only one second, in a course record time edging out defending champion Manuela Schär of Switzerland.

Madison's achievements include:

- runner up in the Boston Marathon in 2023, just six days before her success in the London Marathon
- the first Australian athlete to win four Gold medals in any Para sport at the Commonwealth Games
- the first Australian woman to win the 2021 Tokyo Paralympic Gold medallist in the T54 marathon
- the first Australian athlete to win the New York City Marathon in 2021
- named the 2021 WA Sports Star





GENERAL

READING CAN TAKE YOU ANYWHERE

Our Library is promoting the 2023 Premier's Reading Challenge. Registrations opened Monday 8 May 2023, and the challenge runs until 8 September 2023. Students from Kindergarten to Year 10 can register online and include their school in the registration.

https://www.premiersreadingchallenge.wa.edu.au/Create an account and then sign in.

Students can access over 7,000 book titles, which can be logged onto the students' bookshelf. While the aim of the challenge is for students to log a minimum of 12 books, students can log more. They can log a book that is on the booklist or add a book. By logging books, students can be in the running to win fantastic weekly prizes. The prizes include experiences such as a zipline from Matagarup Bridge. All students who log a minimum of 12 books over the challenge are also in the running for an end-of-year prize.

We ask parents to encourage a love of reading in their child, and the following are some suggestions:

- Discuss the types of books your teen likes to read, such as fiction, non-fiction or poetry. Share the types of books that you enjoy reading.
- Continue to role-model reading different formats and talk with your teen about these.
- Develop an interest in what your teen is reading and ask questions.
- Discuss the value of reading for information and learning, and the value of reading for pleasure.
- Encourage your child to bring their Smart Rider to school to borrow books from our Library.

If you speak a language other than English in your home, it is important to support your child/ren to read in your family's language. Research shows that children who continue to develop their first language will acquire additional languages at a faster rate.

Bilingual books in English and other languages are available at most public libraries and you can add books in other languages to the reading log and these will be counted as part of the challenge. Our students have access on their devices to ePlatform which offers online book titles, and these can be easily translated into many different languages. The library staff can assist with showing students how to access this resource.

Wow ECU has a criminal psychology program!


It looks like the future workforce is in good hands!

YEAR 8 HUMANITIES AND SOCIAL SCIENCES

During Semester 1, Year 8 Gifted and Talented students learned about some of the tectonic and atmospheric forces that are responsible for the damage and destruction of the environment and loss of lives around the world each year. Potential natural disasters can be mitigated through better building design and construction, transport routes, strategic emergency planning.

Utilising these strategies students set about designing models of cities that could withstand a range of natural disasters such as bushfires, cyclones, tsunamis, floods, earthquakes and volcanic eruptions. Their models incorporated a wide range of city design and technological strategies to reduce the potential impact of tectonic movements and extreme weather events. Some of the students elected to create physical models and others chose to use computer programs to generate their disaster-proof cities.

MATHEMATICS

The Year 7 Gifted and Talented students have been exploring the Pythagorean Theorem as part of their extension Mathematics program. They were given the opportunity to present their findings to the class which provided them with the opportunity to deliver a presentation without the pressure of an oral assessment. Some of the students jumped at the chance to practise their public speaking skills.

Many of the students enjoyed the challenge of the Tug of War with Integers game with students taking turns to throw two dice, one with positive integers and one with negative integers. Students then have a choice to add or subtract the integers that they roll and move the counter that number of places on the number line. If the counter reaches -13, Negative has won. If the counter reaches 13, Positive has won. This game created much discussion of how to achieve





ENGLISH

PREPARING TO STUDY YEAR 11 AND 12 ATAR ENGLISH AND/OR LITERATURE

One of the most important thing students can do to prepare for studying ATAR English and/or Literature is to ensure they read widely, regularly, and at the required level of complexity. Strong reading comprehension skills, having a bank of texts to refer to and discuss, and having a good understanding of the world we live in are all keys to success in these courses.

To assist Year 10 students prepare for the reading requirements of ATAR English courses, we have established a shelf of recommended texts in the school library for students to borrow. All students who intend to study these subjects in Year 11 and 12 are strongly encouraged to read texts from this selection, which includes the Year 11 ATAR English set novel, The Book Thief by Marcus Zusak and Literature texts such as The Secret River by Kate Grenville.

FIELD BIOLOGY IN MUNDARING

On 11 May, Year 11 Biology students were provided with the opportunity to visit the Perth Hills Discovery Park in Mundaring. The students explored the vast world of field biology while completing theoretical and practical work, while being treated to stunning views of the forest and Mundaring Weir.

The theoretical work included filling out a booklet based on information learnt along the journey through the park, namely different ways to measure populations of different organisms. The practical work involved students getting to know what real field biology work included, like setting a trap used for collecting population data. Students utilised various tools and equipment for flora species, which meant the data collection of tree canopy cover, humus content, plant cover and litter depth.

The theoretical and practical work increased the our work ethic and interest in biology.














YEAR 11 HUMAN BIOLOGY HEART DISSECTION



YEAR 8 STUDENTS WORKING ON THEIR WELLBEING

We pride ourselves on the safe, inclusive and positive community we uphold at Willetton Senior High School and applaud our year 8 students for their efforts in showing kindness and support for each other.

This sense of community, and upholding the Willo Way, does not come without effort, and our Year 8 students have been active this year in upskilling themselves with a range of strategies they can use to recognise bullying and respond when they see it to protect themselves and others. Last term our Tutor Group Teachers lead the cohort through a series of activities around what bullying looks like and feels like, and how we can show support and respond safely when we see it happening. This will be followed up this term with a session specific to Cybersafety.

We are empowering our students with the skills they need to actively participate in shaping the community they are part of by standing up for positive values. It is very important that we support our youth by reminding them that asking for help and reporting on negative behaviours is not a weakness but a strength, and that even though we want them to develop the skills required to peacefully resolve their own conflicts, it doesn't mean they need to go it alone.

We recognise that many teenagers shy away from talking about antisocial behaviour because they worry about being branded a 'snitch'.

It is so important that we, as their family, teachers and mentors, help them to recognise that talking about antisocial behaviour is beneficial for themselves and those participating in the negative behaviours. Talking about these issues helps our youth to develop empathy, it helps them to work through problems they might be having, and it very often prevents future harm by deescalating situations before they get any worse. Even if your teen is not a big talker, you are doing them a great service by asking them about their day, friends, and problems. It reminds them that you're there when they really do need to talk.

Of course, our students are also encouraged to talk to the staff in Student Services, who are always ready and willing to help them through their problems, whether they are related to bullying or otherwise. We also remind our students and their families that there are a variety of resources they can access for support if they aren't ready to talk about their problem or aren't sure what to do about it. These include kidshelpline, headspace and ReachOut.

It would be remiss not to mention Cyberbullying. As our students reach an age where they gain access to and spend more time on social media, they are unfortunately going to be at increased risk of harmful online behaviours. While parents can feel at a loss sometimes working through this new phenomenon, your involvement is paramount in supporting young people as they learn to develop a healthy relationship with technology. Where are they now?







NATALIE PAGE

Natalie graduated from Willetton in 1986.

She says of the most valuable things learnt at school was touch typing. Her Mum 'made her' attend typing classes, on a typewriter, before school and it has turned out to be a really handy skill to have.

When Natalie finished school, she went straight to Curtin Uni and completed a Bachelor of Science (Nursing). Along the way, she also picked up qualifications in Tropical Medicine (from Liverpool in UK), Midwifery (KEMH), Child Health (Curtin) and Master Public Health (International Stream - University of Melbourne). For most of Natalie's school life she wanted to be a physiotherapist, but at the last minute changed her mind to study nursing and has never regretted that change. At the time, there was widespread famine in Ethiopia and it had a significant impact on her and the decision to work in health. As this is written, again Ethiopia and the surrounding countries are in the grip of the worst drought in 40 years and experiencing significant hunger.

Natalie is now living in Perth, but has lived and worked in 16 different countries and rural areas of Western Australia, as a nurse/midwife. Most of that time, working with a humanitarian aid organisation, in countries affected by conflict or disaster. Sometimes programmes are set up because of civil war and a failing health system, on other occasions a tsunami has literally washed away all of the health infrastructure and resources or refugees have come across borders to seek refuge and need access to health services. She has learnt so much from each country but mostly that we have more in common than we have differences, we all smile the same way, and all want the same things from life - to feel safe, to look after our families and have access to healthcare when needed.

One of Natalie's learning experiences was in Yemen, studying Arabic. Other than Japanese classes at school, she really enjoyed the insight into culture that learning a language gives and will be forever grateful for the patience of people as she stumbled along. Natalie now has enough Arabic to get into trouble, but not always enough to get out of trouble!

Midwifery and nursing has opened many doors and opportunities for Natalie, she feels lucky to have landed in a profession that she loves, that has taken her around the globe, stretched her and given her glimpses into people's lives at some of their most vulnerable moments. Doing what you love is not necessarily always easy but for Natalie it has been extremely rewarding.

Megan graduated in the class of 97.

She studied Marketing Communications and is a marketing and business strategist and entrepreneur and an advocate for female entrepreneurs.
