AUSTRALIAN HISTORY COMPETITION WINNERS

Last term, the Gifted and Talented HaSS classes participated in the Australian History Competition. This competition involved over 35,000 students Australia-wide applying their historical knowledge and skills to unseen sources. We achieved outstanding results, with each year group having scores of at least 15% above the national average.

Additionally, four of our students are State Champions meaning that they received (individually or jointly) the highest marks in Western Australia:

- Cohen Beveridge (Year 8)
- Xinghua Zhu (Year 9)
- Erica Francis (Year 10)
- Mara Hayes- Marche (Year 10)

These students have all received special medallions to commemorate their outstanding achievement.

Two of these students were also judged to be National Champions, meaning they received the highest score in Australia:

- Cohen Beveridge (Year 8)
- Xinghua Zhu (Year 9)

These students will also receive an additional award and a \$250 prize.

Many of our students were extremely successful in this competition, and the table below lists those who achieved a High Distinction.

This level of success is completely unprecedented in our history with this challenging competition, and I congratulate all the students involved and thank their HaSS teachers for supporting them in this endeavour.

THE AUSTRALIAN INTERMEDIATE MATHEMATICS OLYMPIAD COMPETITION



The Australian Intermediate Mathematics Olympiad (AIMO) is a four-hour competition designed to stretch mathematically talented students. It is conducted in schools under examination conditions with students working on their own without the use of calculators or other devices. Students from Year 7 to 10 are selected to compete based on previous AMC and Olympiad performances.

The AIMO is used by the Australian Mathematics Trust as one of the competitions to determine which students are selected to several invitation-only events, including other mathematics competitions, enrichment classes and training schools.

This year, 30 students were chosen to represent our school in this contest. We had eight students from Year 10, ten from Year 9, ten from Year 8 and two very brave Year 7 students. These students are to be congratulated for their diligence and determination to complete all ten questions without any breaks, in the time allocated to this contest.

We wish these students all the very best as we await their results.



Last year when Mr Brand announced that we would be performing *The Lion the Witch and the Wardrobe* for this year's play, we were all excited and could not wait to get started. Since then, it expanded to become a whole school play involving performers from many year groups and people from various departments all over the school.

The journey started long before the script arrived. In August 2020, Mr Brand and Ms Venter started having meetings to discuss how to make this play one of the best Willetton has ever seen. In February of this year, our director Mr Brand watched the St Stephens version of this play which inspired him to also incorporate puppets. In April, we got our scripts and auditions occurred at the end of the month. We were also incredibly lucky to have many other outside specialists come and help us prepare for aspects such as stage combat, puppetry, marketing, lighting, and sound.

Weeks went by and more rehearsals occurred, suddenly it is a week before our first play and everything is coming together, backstage, sound, lighting, and John the marketing manager. It is getting real, fast, and this is when we start to stress out; one week to learn lines, one week to finish rehearsals and one week to try and sell as many tickets as possible. Suddenly, it is the Friday of the primary school performance and we have 350 kids in our audience ready to watch our show which was followed a week later by three other performances. They all went brilliantly and with the amazing responses from audiences,

it was clear to see that all our hard work was worth it. Every tear, every laugh, and every minute outside of school made an impact and made the show a momentous success.


