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PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

This year has moved along quite quickly, and as a result, here I am writing my newsletter article for the end of Term 3. To start with, I am continuing in my theme of giving answers to the most frequent questions about the inner workings of our school. We commonly use acronyms which we assume our community understands; this week, I will explain three of them...

WACE: WESTERN AUSTRALIAN CERTIFICATE OF EDUCATION

The certificate is awarded at the end of Year 12 to students who satisfy three key requirements in literacy and numeracy, breadth and depth and achievement.

ATAR: AUSTRALIAN TERTIARY ADMISSIONS RANK

An ATAR ranges from 99.95 to zero and is a rank position relative to all other students. It considers the number of students who sit Western Australian Certificate of Education in any year and also the number of people of Year 12 school leaving age in the total population.

This means that a student with an ATAR of 75 has achieved as well or better than 75% of the Year 12 school leaver age population in the state. The ATAR allows results in all Australian states to be directly compared.

The ATAR is calculated from the Tertiary Entrance Aggregate which is the sum of the four best scaled scores plus a bonus score if a student studies a Language other than English and/or Mathematics Methods and Specialist. The rank is used by universities across Australia to select Year 12 students for entry into courses.

We offer 33 ATAR courses for students who can study a combination of ATAR and VET Certificate courses.

VET: VOCATIONAL EDUCATION AND TRAINING VET courses and instructional programs focus on the skills required for a particular job function or trade. These skills are in high demand across Australia. Students can complete nationally recognised vocational qualifications at school in partnership with external Registered Training Organisations as part of their school program. We offer eight VET Certificate programs.

We also offer a flexible learning program (FLiS) for Year 11 and 12 students which enables students to access a wide range of qualifications and workplace learning. Students attend school three days a week and complete off-site learning for the other two days.

In addition, students can choose General and Endorsed WACE courses. Our on-line <u>curriculum handbooks</u> give further details of the information above.

In the Willo Way, our students have experienced exciting academic successes and given their time and effort to inspirational community service. Congratulations to all involved. Details are further in this newsletter.

As we draw to the close of another busy term, I take this opportunity to thank our staff for their dedicated efforts on behalf of the students. All have given over and above expectations during this challenging period. Many thanks also to our community for their support.

NAIDOC

We continue to demonstrate our commitment to celebrating Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples' culture in and outside the classroom.

Throughout Week 5 of Term 3, we held our annual NAIDOC week celebration with an array of activities around the school run by learning areas and year groups. The school's commitment to reconciliation, as outlined in the Reconciliation Action Plan, set the tone for engaging and educative activities. Leading into the week many students engaged in reconciliation activities with the Year 7s creating hands that demonstrated their commitment to learning about First Nations people's culture and the Year 10s making bracelets. This was coupled with a successful poster competition that promoted the NAIDOC message GET UP! STAND UP! SHOW UP! a call to action for the community to raise awareness.

Classrooms were alive with NAIDOC activities where students explored Aboriginal languages, stories, art, dance, science, and design. This was coupled with amazing displays produced by many learning areas and the library to help promote a message of reconciliation.

On Tuesday Moorditj Mob from Wesley performed for the Year 9 students. The boys told the stories of the countries around Western Australia and shared them with the students through dance, explaining the totem animals.

Wednesday was highlighted by the return of community leader and former Willetton student Olman Walley and recent graduate Tania Kickett. Olman ran workshops with students throughout the day and played the digeridoo for our staff at recess. The day concluded the annual Kickett-Walley cup between the Binar basketball programme and Willetton. The game was opened by Olman Walley and Willetton came out with a quick start; however, multiple three-pointers from Tanaya Kickett,



for Binar, brought the game back on an even keel. Despite gallant efforts from Willetton, Binar ran away with the game in the final quarter to avenge their loss from the previous year.

On Thursday and Friday, the school ran a mural and dot painting workshop with Ash and Kelly Collard. Aboriginal students invited friends to come share and learn about First Nations culture as the students constructed a mural together that will hang in F Block. The mural tells the story of Aboriginal people meeting between two watering holes and learning from Elders about the six Seasons and the Dreaming. The mural also has two slightly lighter arches depicting Noongar students sharing their culture with other students. This links to our school's plan to take a listening and learning approach to First Nation's cultures.

Thanks to all the staff and students who helped make NAIDOC week a successful, fun, and educative experience in 2022, especially Ms Pisconeri and the Year 11 Health class who ran five separate events throughout the school.

YEAR 10 Hass - United Nations

In Term 3, the Year 10 HaSS GATE classes had a visit from UN Youth. The day-long incursion was split into three sections. A Model United Nations, a South China Sea crisis and another Model UN.

Our proposed resolution for the morning Model UN was regarding child labour. Through the morning, notes were passed between countries, asking for alliances while delegates from different countries gave speeches on what they believed. It was very sensible for the most part, until one of the amendments legalised child labour in the robotics industry to create cheap robots to replace child labour (slightly paradoxical)! Countries turned against each other after agreeing to amendments and when it came to voting on the final resolution, certain countries used their veto power to stop the resolution. It was good fun and ordered chaos!

After recess, we were split into three groups to represent three countries. China, Philippines and Vietnam were facing territorial disputes with warships in claimed territories in the South China Sea. A missile was thrown into the mix, with no clarity upon where the missile was heading. Each group was separated and made unanimous decisions regarding how they could proceed diplomatically

so the missile didn't land upon either warship. Secret alliances, betrayals, press conferences and oil mining are some of the key words that described this session. Not to mention, some people in each group received secret roles, which had their personal agendas that they would try to fulfill throughout the session.

After a lunch break, another model UN session occurred. This time, the resolution was regarding Lethal Autonomous Weapons (LAWS). This was a much faster session, and at the end of the day, we were tired but creative. We introduced amendments of weapons having a kill switch, but also amendments that LAWS can only be used on extra-terrestrials. There were certain countries who were highly against the resolution and didn't want to restrict the advancement of technology. At the end of the session, the resolution was not passed with more than one permanent member state using its veto power to stop the resolution.

Overall, the day had was great as we learnt how the UN Security Council works and had fun being delegates of different countries and speaking our countries' opinions. Thank you to Ms Stevenson and Ms Hale for organising this insightful incursion.

It was a lively session fuelled by intelligent minds, a few snacks and a desire to begin this challenging journey with real knowledge and insight into what is needed now and, in the future, to get into medicine at each university and one day become a doctor.

BIG QUESTIONS FOR GREAT THINKERS...

In Week 6, 23 Year 9 AEP students were lucky enough to attend the Oxford Big Ideas Stretch and Challenge event at Iona Presentation College with Ms Reynolds and Ms Franken.

With about 100 other students from CBC, Mazenod, Kolbe, Iona, St Mark's, Wesley and Servite Colleges, the students explored if justice, truth and beauty are real, is diet a free choice, quantum mechanics and the idea that free will is an illusion.

They were introduced to Plato, the Magna Carta, ontology, narcissism, Einstein, DaVinci and the Vitruvian man, Neils Bohr, the Copenhagen Interpretation and many other great thinkers and big ideas.

Our students relished working with students from other schools and expanding their ideas through discussion, exploration and debate and represented themselves well in small group discussions and in the final debate.



TUTOR SQUAD TO THE RESCUE!

Our peer tutoring program is going really well.

What happens?

Every Wednesday after school students in Years 8, 9 and 10 meet Year 10 and 11 students to get help with their schoolwork.

Well, that's not all we do... first we have a snack prepared by the canteen - thank you so much, Christine and the tea.! Then there is a 10-minute presentation by a visiting teacher on a valuable skill for all students. We call this Pearls of Wisdom and so far, we have had Mrs Litton present on how to use Outlook and One Note more efficiently, Ms Ahern on conquering worded maths problems, Mr Ta on effective study techniques for Science, Ms Bradley and Mr Spicer on support available at Willo and Mr Harvey on how to deliver better presentations.

Who attends?

We currently have 33 student tutors from Year 10 and Year 11 who all have their teachers' support in tutoring in subjects including English, HaSS, Italian, French, Japanese, Maths and Science.

And we have 23 students seeking help, so they often have more than one-on-one attention.

What do people think of the program?

We are getting some great feedback on the program from parents:

How to access help for your child?

If your child is in Year 8, 9 or 10 and they are in any Academic Extension class – English, Languages, Maths or Science – they can apply to get help in ANY subject area, it does not have to be in their AEP subject.

Forms are available in Student Services, the Library and on each year's AEP Connect page. They can be returned to their AEP teacher, to the Library or to Ms Franken in English.









EMPATHY IS REWARDING...

Our AEP Rewards program is largely based in Habits of Mind, developed by Costa and Kallick and elaborated upon by Robert Marzano. Habits of Mind (HoM) is a framework of learning that identifies 16 behaviours that help us become more thoughtful, responsive and innovative.

One of the HoM behaviours we are acknowledging and encouraging in our AEP students is empathy, in particular, listening and understanding with empathy. But what is it? How can students show it and why is it important?

Empathy is defined as simply understanding others, devoting mental energy to another person's thoughts and ideas and aiming to to perceive another's point of view.

Students can demonstrate empathy towards their classmates by taking time to understand not only what they say but also what they mean. This works well in group discussions when students are trying to articulate complex ideas.

Students can also take time to understand their peers when they express particular needs and concerns, and they can try to understand where they are coming from.

It is important for many reasons, personal and academic.

The Harvard Graduate School of Education says that students with empathy display:

- More classroom engagement
- · Higher academic achievement
- Better communication skills
- · Lower likelihood of bullying
- Less aggressive behaviours and emotional disorders
- More positive relationships

Empathy is also linked to more positive outcomes in adulthood.

As part of the whole school wellbeing focus, Student Services and tutor teachers have worked on developing student empathy and AEP teachers are on the lookout for and working to encourage the same in our classes.

2022 SIMPSON PRIZE COMPETITION RESULTS

Congratulations to Qi Qi Liu who has been declared winner for Western Australia in the prestigious Simpson Prize Competition.

The Simpson Prize is a national competition for Year 9 and 10 students that focuses on the service of Australians in World War I. Entrants are required to respond to an essay question, using sources from the Simpson Prize Australian War Memorial Source Selection and their own research. Winners and runners-up are chosen from each state and territory.

The winners and runners-up were selected from 474 entries from students nation-wide. One winner and one runner-up from each State and Territory participated in a commemorative program in Canberra. Winning students also travelled to key historical and commemorative sites in Norfolk Island.

Following is Qi Qi's overview of her commemorative tour. We are very proud of her achievement and thank her for being an exemplary ambassador for Willetton Senior High School.

During the July holidays, I had the privilege to go to Canberra and Norfolk Island as a part of the Simpson Prize. It was an honour to have been chosen as the WA winner. For the first time in two years, the trip went ahead.

Our Canberra tour was packed with a variety of fun and educational activities such as visiting the National Archives of Australia where we touched real records from WWI. It was a privilege to visit facilities generally not open to the public, especially the Treloar Centre. We were shown many historical artefacts, including military aircraft and vehicles. The Australian War Memorial was also a memorable aspect of the trip; we met the Director of the AWM, Mr. Anderson who spoke to us about the history and stories behind the memorial. It was amazing to see the memorial in person after using their sources in my essay.

On the final day in Canberra, the award ceremony at Parliament House was attended by Jason Clare, the Minister for Education. Throughout the trip we met many accomplished and prominent figures in their respective fields; I am very grateful to have been given such an opportunity.

Norfolk Island has a fascinating history and through our various activities, we were given a glimpse into its past of convict settlement and mutiny. The island itself, situated in the South Pacific has beautiful sandy beaches against the backdrop of luscious green pine trees, a very picturesque landscape indeed. Norfolk Island gave us such a culture shock; cows and chickens freely roam the island as they please. Our ghost tour at night through some of the ruins was eerily entertaining; they say Norfolk Island is one of the most haunted islands in the world.

Overall, the trip was an experience of a lifetime; not only were the venues we visited exciting, but it was also fun to meet other students from across the country.




2022 STATE SCHOOLS' CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION 2022

MATHS TALENT QUEST

The Maths Talent Quest (MTQ) is an annual activity organised by the Mathematical Association of Western Australia (MAWA), first held in 1982. The focus of the MTQ is the process of mathematical investigations and models. It aims to promote interest in mathematics and foster positive attitudes amongst students, teachers and parents. Students choose a novel topic/concept to investigate, either individually or as a group of six students maximum. The project is submitted in the form of an investigative report, creative essay, media or poster.

Each project is judged at a state level, according to their year level and category (group or individual). After the state judging, one High Distinction entry from each year level and category is selected to compete at the National MTQ.

We are one of the 14 schools that participated in MTQ this year with three teams:

 the project COVID Stats and Facts.

- A Year 12 student, Robert Lewis investigated An Analytical Method for Determining Equations of Rotated Parabolas.

Amongst the 91 submissions submitted, our Year 10 and 12 projects have received a High Distinction, and both are nominated to represent WA to compete at the National MTQ.

Congratulations to all the participants for such an amazing achievement.

Stay tuned at this space as we wait for the national judging to finals.


Thank you to Peter Lee for organising this competition and coaching the three teams and to Karen Gatland who assisted coaching the Year 10 team.

From 24 May to 9 August, we have spent around 78 days focussed on this project. Our first task was to decide on a project topic. We had many ideas, and it was hard to decide at first. Then we came up with the idea of finding the cost of colonising Mars. The massive project titled *Reach for the Mars* was to be split into seven sections: training, transport, resources, terraforming, population growth, technological development and finance.

For over the span of 8 weeks, we have emailed and confirmed with each other as we conducted research on each of these topics. Day by day, our numbers were soaring into the sky. We were putting in pictures, graphs, tables, equations and editing the format of our report. The report concluded at an incredible 89 pages.

Here are a few snippets of our findings:

- Cost of training = \$66.9 billion USD
 = \$6.70*10¹⁰ USD
 - Cost of annual astronaut salary = \$6.39*10⁷ USD
- Cost of transport = \$3.20 billion USD
 = \$3.20*10⁹ USD
 - Cost of annual transport-related salary = \$637,124,199 USD = \$6.37*108 USD
- Cost of resources (total) = \$4.29*108 USD
- Cost of terraforming = \$1.69*10¹⁸ USD

YEAR 8 SCIENCE BIOLOGY - COMPARING RESPIRATORY SYSTEMS OF HUMANS AND FISH

Year 8 students carried out a fish dissection on Honeycomb Cod, bought from Seafresh, Myaree.

They explored the structure of the gills and how they work so fish can extract 80% of oxygen from water.

The alveoli in our lungs and gills are similar in structure and function to allow easy diffusion of oxygen into and carbon dioxide out of the blood.

Fun fact: it is estimated that 300 million alveoli are in an adult lung and the total surface area is approximately the size of a tennis court.
