Secondly, filming with veterans Chris Reason and Geoff Parry brings with it demands to go above and beyond. Whether it be capturing the ground level drama and destruction by shooting innovative pieces to camera with a gimbal, or the destruction from a bird's eye drone view, Simon used all his skills in dangerous and unpredictable conditions. Simon's camerawork inside the biggest story on the planet was world class.

MADISON DE ROZARIO WON WOMEN IN SPORT AWARDS TOP GONG

Former Willetton student, Paralympic great Madison de Rozario pipped a star-studded field to win at the Women's Health Women in Sport Awards 2022.

Madison is a four-time Paralympian and claimed two golds in Tokyo, in the 800m T53 and Marathon T54, while she also won the New York City marathon, becoming the first Aussie woman to win in either the wheelchair or open events.

Then in Birmingham she became the first Australian para-athlete to win four gold medals at the Commonwealth Games, repeating in the 1500m T54 and Marathon T54.

In 2021 Willetton Senior High School invited all members of the school community to participate in the online National School Opinion Survey (NSOS). 2171 surveys were completed (298 by parents).

The survey results continue to indicate that members of the school community are very satisfied with the performance of the school. Typically, a mean of 3.0 - 3.9 indicates a high level of satisfaction whilst a mean of 4.0 and higher indicates a strong level of satisfaction.

DUKE OF EDINBURGH'S INTERNATIONAL AWARD SILVER AWARD BIBBULMUN TRACK HIKE OCTOBER 2022

Originally five days, the Silver Bibbulmun Track Hike had to be shortened to three days, due to COVID-19 concerns. Thankfully, the weather on the hike was mostly pleasant, despite a short period of rain at the start.

It was an emotional rollercoaster walking with our heavy backpacks through the track and a large stretch of dense forest. Not only was it physically tough, our mental toughness was also challenged. However, having 14 other people going through the same experience kept us motivated. Though at times it was tough, the 15 of us have all grown much closer and managed to work together to overcome any obstacles.

The small victories and little challenges have made every part worth it and it is truly an eye-opening experience that has taught me the true meaning of leadership and teamwork. It has taught us to not just think as an individuals, but as a group, and to all contribute to accomplish our goals. Reaching the end of our 35km long journey was so rewarding, every challenging step we took made the victory even sweeter.

BIOBARCODE @ WILLO

Term 3 marked the beginning of the BioBarcode Club at Willetton, and we were all very excited as the formation of this club was something we had looked forward to and had planned for a while. Led by BioBarcode's founder and director, Pauline Charman and science teacher, Mrs Atkinson, we were able to successfully establish the first BioBarcode club within our very own school grounds.

BioBarcode was established to involve and educate students in a hands-on method of identifying, mapping, and monitoring Australian flora and fauna. This process is called DNA barcoding and is usually done by research scientists, but now we can help scientists by contributing to actual data that we gather at school using this technique. There are still 70% of Australian insects, plants, fungi that haven't been classified and recorded, so this is an endeavour to get this done so we can better manage our diminishing biodiversity. Pauline aims to teach more people, especially students, about the importance of sustaining our biodiversity, and she did just that when she established the BioBarcode Club here at Willetton.

Under the guidance of Pauline, Mrs Atkinson, and passionate BioBarcode ambassadors, we were able to master our pipetting techniques, and learned more about the process of barcoding, how polymerase chain reaction (PCR) works, and the significance of gel electrophoresis in the barcoding process. A special thank you to

the biotechnology company, Promega International who gifted us a crucial reagent (the GoTAQ G2 Green Mastermix) that was needed to perform PCR.

At school, we are able to use the school's own miniPCR machines, they are the same type being used in experiments on the International Space Station at the moment! We then give our samples to Murdoch University's sequencing facility where the genetic code of the samples is determined. Finally, we input our genomic data into bioinformatic software to find out if our samples were in the global data base of species.

During an early session we went on a tour around the school with head gardener, Graeme. We were able to scout places to find species to barcode, while also learning about the local flora at our school. Across many club sessions, we processed (barcoded) a variety of species we collected ourselves, including dandelions and insects, such as grasshoppers and cockroaches (although most of us were horrified at the thought of barcoding them).

Through the program, we have been able to meet scientists, including Dr Charlotte Oskam, who is a senior lecturer at Murdoch University, and the recipient of the prestigious WA Young Tall Poppy Award in 2022. Having completed her PhD, she currently pursues research on tic borne diseases and novel bacteria. Her extensive research and findings for her publishings began when she focused on DNA sequencing, barcoding of genes, mainly from fossils and various other organisms. Dr Oskam gave us some of her time to come over to the school and explain to us about her profession and her experiences in the world of science.

This club has also enabled us to further explore our growing interest in the use of biotechnology and the importance of biodiversity, which included the opportunity to visit the Western Australian State Agricultural Biotechnology Centre (SABC), located at Murdoch University, which houses a 3730XL DNA Analyser, an extremely large machine that was the type used to sequence the Human Genome. We were taken on a short tour of the SABC by the incredibly knowledgeable Frances Briggs, who explained to us how the 3730XL DNA Analyser and DNA sequencing worked. We were grateful for this excursion, as it allowed us to not only learn more about the advancement of biotechnology over time, but also provided us with a break from our classroom set up of a laboratory, and a chance to witness a professional working space where DNA was processed, sequenced and analysed daily.

This club has been a wonderful and fulfilling experience, and we are extremely grateful to have been able to be a part of it which is the first one in an Australian school. BioBarcode has enabled us to learn so much more about the importance of biodiversity and biotechnology, and we hope that this club will continue running in future years.


To support continued high standards, we have a literacy coordinator working across all learning areas. Our extension and support groups continue to work with students all literacy levels.






WESTERN AUSTRALIAN JUNIOR MATHEMATICS OLYMPIAD

The Western Australian Junior Mathematics Olympiad attracts the best Year 7, 8 and 9 mathematics students from around the state where all students attempt the same questions regardless of age. This year there were 478 students competing from 24 different public and private schools. Forty students were selected to compete in the individual competition online at school and at the University of Western Australia for the team competition.

Year 7 Chuqi Zhang was recognised with a merit award and placed 4th amongst the Year 7 competitors.



Year 11 and 12 students wishing to sell their textbooks on a consignment basis may bring in their books to the secondhand bookshop during trading hours or drop them off at the front office. Please ensure you fill in the required bookshop form before dropping your books off. Forms are available from the front office, School Board office and bookshop, or may be downloaded from the school website.

Depending on their condition, books are priced at approximately 2/3 the cost of new books, with the Board retaining a 20% commission once the books are sold.

Students are encouraged to bring in their books as early as possible, to have them catalogued and on the shelves ready to be sold when the demand is highest. Please do not bring in books

that are no longer on the booklist or an old edition. We are unable to sell them or have the facility to store them and unfortunately these will be discarded.

We also stock a range of lower school resource material, calculators, class pads, math-o-matts and language dictionaries.

Year 10 and Year 11 students are invited to visit the second hand bookshop to purchase your Year 11 and Year 12 booklist requirements for 2023. Many of the textbooks are half to two thirds the price of new textbooks. 2023 booklists will be available soon.

WILLO PARENT GROUP MEETINGS

2022 has been a quiet year for Willo Parent Group meetings, with the limitations of COVID restrictions.

We are glad that we were able to offer one online seminar called the Fear-Less Triple P Seminar in October, presented by our school psychologist Sarah loannidis. In this seminar, parents were introduced to information about anxiety and provided with positive parenting strategies that support the development and behaviour of children and adolescents with anxiety. Topics covered included; understanding how anxiety works, being a good role model of anxiety management to your children, becoming effective emotion coaches, understanding and teaching the value of flexible thinking, managing their children's anxiety effectively, and using constructive coping. Opportunity was provided for parents to ask questions throughout the seminar. Feedback from parents following the seminar showed that they found the tips and strategies in recognising and managing their child's anxiety were very helpful.

Future topics that parents said they would be interested in attending include addressing mental health, resilience and how to manage emotions and behaviour. If you have topic suggestions for meetings, please feel to forward them through to
