#### NATIONAL SCHOOL OPINION SURVEY

Again in 2023 we invited all members of the school community to participate in the National School opinion Survey (NSOS). 2254 surveys were completed (360 by parents). The data is used to inform planning for improvement.

The survey results continue to indicate that members of the school community are satisfied with the performance of the school. Typically, a mean pf 3.0-3.9 indicates a high level of satisfaction whilst a mean of 4.0 and higher indicates a strong level of satisfaction.



# OUR SCIENCE TALENT SEARCH WINNERS 2023

#### THIRD PLACE IN RESEARCH INVESTIGATION

Our project was about measuring the lifting force of three electromagnets - two of them made by us and the third one was supplied by the laboratory. We had to use an electronic balance in order to find the lifting force of each electromagnet for 2, 4, 6, 8, 10 and 12 volts.

Being a part of this amazing project was a great privilege and opportunity for us to learn about the relationship between how the number of copper wire turns for an electromagnet and its lifting force. As a group of three, we took videos, collected data, photos and created graphs to represent the data. The most memorable part of measuring the lifting force of the electromagnets was when we made electromagnet with 600 copper wire turns had a lifting force of 99.9g- so close to 100g.

#### THIRD PLACE YEAR 9-10 SCIENCE INVESTIGATION

#### How Much is Too Much? Citric acid vs Teeth enamel

Our investigation consisted of the synthesis of artificial teeth enamel and using this to test the degradation of teeth enamel in varying concentrations of citric acid. After an exciting and stressful month of hard work, research, and assistance from our benevolent Year 10 Science teacher, Dr Harris, we successfully completed our investigation project and write-up.

#### **FIRST IN RESEARCH INVESTIGATION YEARS 7-8**

#### Fruit Juice vs Sports Drink Electrolyte

We conducted an investigation to test whether fruit juice contained more electrolytes than sports drinks in order to determine which substance would replenish the ions and electrolytes lost in the body. A total of eight different substances were tested, our results indicated that orange juice contained the greater number of electrolytes.


# ROWE SCIENTIFIC ENCOURAGEMENT AWARD YEAR 9-10 SCIENCE INVESTIGATION


